Barnes, Derrick. <u>Crown: An Ode to the Fresh Cut</u>. Illustrated by Gordon C. James. How amazing can walking out of the barbershop with the perfect haircut make you feel? Stunning paintings and vibrant storytelling provide a joyful celebration of community, culture, and self-esteem.



Cherry, Matthew A. <u>Hair Love</u>. Illustrated by Vashti Harrison. It's an important day for Zuri (Mommy's coming home!), and she wants to have an extra-special hairstyle. Fortunately, Daddy is there, ready and willing to help his daughter look and feel her best.






Copeland, Misty. <u>Firebird</u>. Illustrated by Christopher Myers.



Giovanni, Nikki. **I Am Loved**. Illustrated by Ashley Bryan.






Mora, Oge. Saturday.




Pinkney, Brian. Puppy Truck.



A toe-tapping, heart-lifting appreciation of everyday life.

Timbaland, & Christopher Myers. Nighttime Symphony.

As a thunderstorm rages outside their city window, a loving father sooths his young son by helping him find the beauty in the sights and sounds of the storm. Rhythmic text and bright-hued illustrations create an imaginative and reassuring lullaby.





Weatherford. Carole Boston. In Your Hands. Illustrated by Brian Pinkney. Luminously illustrated and lyrically told, this moving poem from a mother to her newborn son describes her dreams for Omari's future and her hopes that he will always be safe, ending with a resounding refrain, "Black lives matter. Your life matters."

Woodson, Jacqueline. The Day You Begin. Illustrated by Rafael López. It may be hard to reveal your inner self to others, especially when no one else in the room is quite like you, but maybe you will find that if you share your story, you just might find common ground—and a new friend. An inclusive and inspirational ode to embracing the beauty in your life and sharing it with others.
